College of Public Health GE Policies:

- General Education courses (excluding Social Diversity and Global Studies courses) will not count for more than one General Education category.
- If 2 Historical Study courses are completed, then no Cultures & Ideas courses are required. If one Cultures & Ideas course is completed than only one Historical Study course is required.
- While Biology 1114 and Math 1151 are listed as Open Options courses with the Environmental Public Health specialization they are required courses of the specialization.
- A minimum of 30 credit hours must be earned through regular course enrollment at Ohio State.
- 5. Students admitted to the BSPH program (Autumn 2013 and after) are required to maintain a semester and cumulative GPA of 2.80 (after a minimum of 24 credits) or higher until they graduate from the University. Students are also required to earn at least a C- or higher in all courses comprising their major.
- Courses may not be counted on both the GE and the major.
 Courses taken to fulfill GE requirements may count on the
 minor unless specifically disallowed by an individual minor
 program. Courses may not be counted on both the major and
 the minor.
